Myanmar HEIs: Challenges and Needs

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Myanmar HEIs: Challenges and Needs



- 1. Excessive bureaucratization
 - Need to address formal request for every issue of academic life (participation in joint research, in mobility programs, signing MOUs)
 - Need to act promptly in response to international proposals
 - Time spent by administrative and academic staff in reporting activities
- 2. Precariousness of International Relations Offices
 - Lack of dedicated staff with specific competences
 - Management roles performed by academic staff on top of their teaching and research duties
- 3. Insufficient budget and financial allocation
 - No financial autonomy
 - Difficulties in access and management of external funds
 - No full time appointments for key management roles



Challenges in Laos, Myanmar and Sri Lanka



Common constraints

- Lack of university autonomy
- Lack of ICT infrastructures
- Weak data management with limited file-sharing and websites
- Low level of competences in English as a foreign language and in ICT skills for teaching, research and administration



Low levels of staffing in IROs



Myanmar HEIs: results of training in Vilnius



- 1. SWOT analysis
 - Confirms many of the findings in the Toolkit WP1 report.
 - Opportunities include more collaboration between universities in Myanmar
 - Weaknesses include poor ICT facilities, lack of capacity (staff time) and lack of funds.
- 2. Action plans include:
 - Developing international strategy
 - Training for ICO/IRO staff
 - Upgrading ICT facilities
 - Improving websites and printed publicity materials
 - Increasing student mobility
 - Full-time staff for ICO/IRO



Six possible areas of collaboration



- 1. Sharing international strategies and agreeing common approaches to explaining the system of higher education in Myanmar.
- 2. Sharing best practice in developing websites, prospectuses and other documents used to promote our universities internationally.
- 3. Joint approaches to welcoming and supporting incoming international exchange students: preparing a shared "Study in Myanmar" guide.
- 4. Sharing the experience of international visits: this might include consideration of a joint delegation to international events and conferences.
- 5. Joint training activities on all aspects of international cooperation.
- 6. Setting up a professional group of international cooperation officers.


